My time in Tanzania, Africa

Jambo (greetings). On November 28th I departed the snow and freezing weather of Northeast Ohio and went on a journey to Tanzania, Africa for a study abroad trip with Hiram College. After a 20 hour plane ride, I found myself walking out of the airplane and looking at Mount Kilimanjaro, Africa's tallest peak. The first week in Africa was one for us to get acquainted with the culture with our daily Swahili lesson and interacting with many of the people on the streets. Interestingly enough, we actually stated at a hostel that was owned by the Catholic Archdioceses of Arusha, Tanzania. Every morning I would wake and greet the sisters of the Hostel. Since they did not really know English, all they would say is 'Mungubariki wewe," which means God Bless you always. One Sunday I was fortunate enough to go to a mass and it was one of the few times in my life where I was completely blown away. There I was witnessing true witnesses of faith from hundreds of natives who made less than a dollar a day: some did not even have the basic needs that someone deserves in life. It is truly amazing because I know many people who are financially wealthy and materially sound in America that are not half as in peace or as happy as some of the individuals I saw. It really made me put my life in perspective.

After the first week, my fellow students and I departed to our individual home stays where we spent two and a half weeks. I was blessed to be placed with a wonderful 3 person family that really seemed to enjoy my company. The family consisted of my house mom, a 52 year old woman that grew and sold crops, and her two boys. They truly treated me as one of their own and taught me about the African culture that they live in. For the rest of my life I will be forever grateful to all three of them.

Meanwhile, while I was staying at my home stay, I was working at an orphanage during the day. Inhabiting this orphanage were 32 children that used to live and beg on the street, many of which have no families to turn to. It is also important to know that most of these children did not even know their real age because their birth records are lost or destroyed. Nevertheless, these 32 children were full of energy and really seemed to understand the importance of a good education. While there, I mostly taught mathematics and played games with many of the younger kids.

Halfway throughout out trip, we were fortunate enough to go on a three day, two night, wild Safari tour. While on Safari, I saw some of the most beautiful landscapes and animals that I have ever seen. Just to name a few, we saw Lions,

Elephants, Giraffes, Hippos, Zebras, Ba boons, Antelope, Wildebeest, Hyenas, Cheetahs, Rhinos, etc. It was incredible to see many of the animals that I heard about so much growing up in their natural habitats. To finish our trip, we spent the last four days on the island of Zanzibar, which is an island off the Tanzanian mainland. During our stay, we went on a tour of the Spice farms, snorkeled in the Indian Ocean, and went on a tour of the historic city, Stonetown. In addition, we were also fortunate to go on a tour of the last open slave market in the world, which shut down in 1864. It was guite the experience to enter into the chamber where 50 to 70 slaves were incarcerated for three weeks (many died) with little food and water before they were whipped and sold. After witnessing and hearing about the lives that the slaves of the past had to endure, I definitely have a greater appreciation of my own life and the lives that we American's life on an everyday basis.

Overall, I had the experience of a lifetime. I definitely treated my study abroad trip as a mission trip and really believe that I did something good, especially at the orphanage I worked at and with host family I lived with. I really learned to appreciate my life and realize that we as Americans are truly blessed. 
